"Walk on air against y

Senior Football Final between Clonmel Commercials and Loughmore-Castleiney, Seamus Heaney's poem "The Gravel Walks" springs to mind.

It's a poem about hard work – wheeling barrows of gravel – and there's no doubt that hard work will be the name of the game today. There is no easy way to win a county final. You have to roll up your sleeves and put the hard work in. But of course hard work isn't enough, so at some stage in the match one of these teams will have to take a risk and be prepared to, as Seamus Heaney advised in that famous line that is now the epitaph on his headstone, "Walk on air against your better judgement".

Today's protagonists are entirely predictable with the county's undisputed dominant force in one corner and their arch nemesis in the other. In fact, in the 60 county finals played since 1961, one of either Clonmel Commercials or Loughmore-Castleiney have appeared in 41 of those deciders. Surprisingly though, in those 60 years, this is only the fifth time they meet each other in the final. The score stands at two each.

If you look a bit deeper into the history, since the first county final was played in 1886, this will be the 31st appearance of both sides in the final. Commercials have won 19 of their previous 30 finals while Loughmore-Castleiney have won 14.

After moonwalking their way through the championship, Clonmel Commercials were given both a character and footballing examination against JK Brackens in the county semi-final. They passed the character examination with honours but would have been disappointed with their footballing mark. In many ways that's probably the ideal preparation for a county final. They won the game, they showed character and are still left with a bit to work on, which guards against complacency.

Commercials are beginning to dominate here in Tipperary and if they were to add another title this weekend, making it three on the bounce, it would be a massive achievement for their club.

Loughmore-Castleiney came through on the other side of the draw and no doubt they have had the hardest path to the final. They survived a scare against Kilsheelan-Kilcash in the quarter-final but put in an improved performance in the semi-final, where they had to look deep inside themselves to find their famous "never say die" reserves, to beat Moyle Rovers with the last play of the game.

Having already beaten two of the so called "Big 5" en-route to today's final (they also drew with JK Brackens in the group stages), if Loughmore-Castlleiney were to collect the O'Dwyer Cup at 4pm today, nobody could say they won a "soft county" (if such a concept even exists).

I normally cite turnovers as an important factor in winning any game and indeed the team that wins the turnover count will win the game 82% of the time. While turnovers will play an important role again today, I feel that the team that can transition from defence to attack the quickest, is the team that will give themselves the best chance of coming out on top.

star names and marking them makes minding mice at a crossroads seem like an easy task. After his wonder goal in last year's county final, Michael Quinlivan will obviously be the one all Loughmore-Castleiney defenders will be keeping an eye on. But it's full forward Sean O'Connor who has "blossomed" into a player this year and his 6:15 in the championship so far is an impressive tally in just four matches. Then when you throw in players like Seamus Kennedy, Ross Peters, Jason Lonergan, the Kennedy brothers, Colman, Jack and Conal, plus arguably their player of the year so far, Kevin Fahey, then you can immediately see the task facing Loughmore-Castleiney.

Whether it's winning primary possession or turning over Loughmore-Castleiney, attacking at pace, either on foot or by foot, is absolutely essential if Clonmel Commercials are to win today. They were spooked by the JK Brackens sweeper system in the semi-final and their transition was slow and ponderous, too often going sideways instead of forward. I have no doubt this is an area that Charlie McGeever and his cabinet will have addressed over the past two weeks and the wide open spaces of Tom Semple's Field should help in this regard. If Othey get this aspect of their play right, then they

will be hard to beat.

Of course, Loughmore-Castleiney are not short of quality players themselves. Liam McGrath and Conor Ryan are rightly ranked amongst the best forwards in the county, while Liam Treacy can field and score with the best of them. John Meagher is a colossus in defence and is aided and abetted by the likes of Tommy Maher, Lorcan Egan and John Ryan who week-in and week-out do unpaid and unpensionable work. But it's the McGrath brothers who make this team tick. Although he is on the Tipperary hurling team, I have long believed that John McGrath is one of the best footballers in Tipperary but if you concentrate too much on stopping John, then his brothers Noel and Brian are capable of doing the damage.


I have watched Loughmore-Castleiney in nearly all their games this year and they have improved with every game. In the group stage against JK Brackens they were like a Munster rugby team. When they got possession, they put it up the jumper and slowly worked it to the scoring zone, where they relied on Conor Ryan frees. Since then, their transition from defence to attack has improved beyond measure, so much so, that they are now creating a scoring opportunity with nearly every attack.


So who will win?

Both teams will arrive in Semple Stadium with a simple but essential check-list.

- Go as hard as you can for as long as you can
- Win your own kick-out
- Keep possession
- Turnover opposition possession
- Shoot from the scoring zone.

Normally I'm not shy about offering my thoughts as hostages to fortune but when you have two teams of the quality of Clonmel Commercials and Loughmore-Castleiney, who are so evenly matched that they will both tick off every item on the above checklist, then this is a game that may well be won by the team that's prepared to take a risk and "walk on air against your better judgement".







CAN LAST YEAR'S FINALISTS TAKE ONE EXTRA STEP TO SENIOR GRADE THIS YEAR?

TODAY'S opening number is the FBD Insurance County Intermediate Football Final, where we should see a contrast in styles between an experienced, steady as you go Drom-Inch side and a young swashbuckling Grangemockler-Ballyneale team.

At the start of this year, many experts and even some non-experts considered Drom-Inch as dark horses to win the Intermediate Football Championship. As soon as their hurling commitments finished, they were rightly upgraded to very very bright horses indeed.

Having lost the opening game of the championship to Galtee Rovers, they re-grouped to record comfortable victories of Cashel King Cormacs and Fr Sheehy's scoring 4-26 in those two games.

When the standard increased in the county quarter-final, they weren't found wanting and accounted for a very good Golden/Kilfeacle side on a day when the weather was so bad that even the frogs decided to stay indoors.

But it was the manner of their semi-final win over Fethard which was the most impressive. Just like in the quarter-final, they were out of the blocks early and took control of the game from the start, building up a six points to one lead at half-time. It was a lead they never looked like relinquishing as they game-managed the second half expertly and eventually ran out comfortable winners on a scoreline of 0-10 to 0-5.

After that win ,much was made of the size and physicality of this Drom-Inch team. While some of that commentary has merit, it would be rather unfair to put their progress in this year's championship simply down to them being a big strong team. They have some wonderful footballers within their ranks with Emmet Moloney, David Butler, Colm Kinnane and Jimmy Mullen all having played football for Tipperary at various levels over the last few years. Tipperary hurling captain Seamus Callinan, returned to their side for the semi-final to give a calm and assured display while up front, free taker David Collins continues to show opposition teams that crime doesn't pay.

Today marks the 101st anniversary of the death of Grangemockler's most famous son, Michael Hogan,

who was murdered by crown forces in Croke Park on Bloody Sunday. Given the significance of the date, no doubt there will be a haze of goodwill surrounding this Grangemockler/Ballyneale team, but as we all know, the Gods that govern Gaelic Football don't often get sentimental and if they are to win today they will have to earn it.


Last year's beaten finalists entered this year's championship as pre-tournament favourites and so far they have lived up to that billing. In the group stages they were drawn in what many considered to be a three team group of death but they comfortably accounted for Clonmel Óg in the first game before overcoming a strong Mullinahone side to top the group.


Clonoulty-Rossmore proved no match for them in the quarter-final where they ran out 4-15 to 1-5 winners, but it was their semi-final performance against Galtee Rovers/St Pecaun that has many people believing this team has finally come of age.

I have made no secret of the fact that, in my view, this young Grangemckler/Ballyneale team are probably the most exciting team to watch in Tipperary football at the moment and you would expect players like John Lyons, Mikey Lyons, Leon Kennedy, Jamie Walsh, Mark O'Meara, Sean Daly and Manus McFadden to revel in the wide open spaces of Semple Stadium today.

But it's the contrast in styles makes this game really hard to call. It may well come down to the team that can score the most goals and the weather on the day could play a huge part in deciding that. A fine day should help Grangemocker-Ballyneale's fast slick passing game as the ball is more likely to stick, meaning they can avoid having to fight for the second ball against a physically stronger team. A wet day might suit Drom-Inch as they can use their strength to win primary possession and such is their ability that they could have Grangemocker men chasing shadows for long periods of the game.

A wise man would wait until Sunday morning and consult the weather glass before making a prediction on this game but nobody has ever considered me a wise man and at the time of writing, that most unreliable of forecasters, the weather app on my iphone, is telling me that Sunday will be a fine day, so I'm calling this one in favour of Grangemockler-Ballyneale.




footballer Michael Hogan was one of 14 killed on Bloody Sunday on November 21st 1920. His resting place is at Grangemockler graveyard.
