We wish to express our gratitude to FBD Insurance for their continued support of our Club Championships in Tipperary and I welcome all their representatives to today's final.


We wish the referees in today's finals the very best of luck. On behalf of the County Board, I thank them and all the referees who officiated at our games during the year.

HIS IS the biggest weekend in the Tipperary Football calendar with county finals taking place across three adult championship competitions. These are huge games for all the players, mentors and supporters of the six clubs involved and on behalf of the Tipperary Football committee I wish all involved the very best of luck.

In the senior final, we have a novel pairing, with Upperchurch/Drombane making their first ever appearance at this stage of the competition. Their advancement on the football front, whilst drawing attention in recent weeks, has been ongoing for a number of decades. The foundations for this year's progress were laid many years ago, when a conscious effort was made to encourage equal participation in both codes across all age grades in the club. In the opposing corner we have in Clonmel Commercials one of the traditional powerhouses of Tipperary football. They continue to set the highest of standards for all others to match and maintain the proud tradition of footballing excellence in South Tipperary.

The Intermediate competition also throws up an interesting contrast, with both clubs coming from opposite ends of the county – both in terms of geographical location and football heritage. Facing them are an undoubtedly talented Killenaule outfit, a team that only a few years ago contested a senior final. A very interesting game in store.



A FASCINATING G

HOSE OF YOU familiar with John B. Keane's play Sive will recall the traveller Pats Bocock banging his blackthorn stick against the ground as he told his son Carthalawn to "give it your best, your almighty best". In the dressing rooms beneath the Old Stand this afternoon, there is little doubt that Upperchurch-Drombane manager Eoin Shortt and Clonmel Commercials manager Tommy Morrissey, will be channelling their inner Pats Bocock and exhorting their players to go out and "give it your best your almighty best". Both men are shrewd enough to know that anything less won't get the job done.

For many people Upperchurch-Drombane are the surprise package in this year's championship but if you drill a little bit deeper then the surprise is not really a surprise at all. They have made it to the quarter-final stage of the championship in three of the last four years and it was only a matter of time before this talented group of players would progress further.



But of course, this generation of Upperchurch-Drombane players didn't invent football in the parish. Club stalwarts like Pat Phelan, the late Packie Ryan and the late Pakie Phelan were always passionate about promoting football.

Whether they are watching from the stand or looking down from above, there is no doubt a lot of Upperchurch-Drombane people will be bursting with pride as they watch D'Church march behind the Moycarkey Pipe Band today. As an aside, it has been some year in the Phelan household. It was Pat's grandson, Paddy who floated in "that free" in the dying seconds of the All Ireland Minor Hurling Final this year. Carlsberg don't do perfect GAA years but if they did ...

My first encounter with Upperchurch-Drombane footballers was back in the mid 80's when we played games of backs v forwards in the small narrow school field beside Templemore CBS as it was known back then. When the teams were being picked, I was praying that I wouldn't be put marking former Tipperary hurling manager, Mick Ryan. That man was so competitive, he would turn a communion breakfast into an eating competition. When he called "Mick's ball", he shouted it with such authority and urgency that I felt it was only right to let him have it. It was the safer option!

Tipperary Football Chairman, Conor O'Dwyer was also on that team and was probably a classier footballer who in his own way every bit as competitive as Mick (although he didn't sing "In The Ghetto" on the bus home from matches as good as Mick).

Throw in lads from that generation like Paudie Bourke, a wing forward who could actually score, Seamie Griffin, Pat Carey, Donal Carey, the two Tom Ryan's (Glown and Cooga), Nippy Casey and Red Gerry who were all very capable footballers and you will soon see that Upperchurch-Drombane always produced decent players.

What this current team have done though is they have raised the standards to a new level. Much has been rightly made of their commitment and fitness but in my opinion not enough has been made of their footballing ability. They really do have some wonderfully talented footballers.

Every team needs flagship players and Paul and Luke Shanahan are Eoin Shortt's talismen.

Between them they have contributed almost 80% of the Upperchurch-Drombane scores in this years championship. Of course they have the roof over their heads provided for them by players like Jack Butler, Gavin and Keith Ryan, Loughlin Ryan, goalkeeper James Griffin and not forgetting county man Dean Carew, who all go about there job with such efficiency and determination that the Shanahan brothers can just go out and play.

A hallmark of the Upperchurch game this year has been their ability to win dirty ball and then retain it. When they get it they generally don't give it back to you too easily. They arrive in todays FBD County Senior Football Final on the back of two outstanding performances against J.K.Brackens and last year's champions Loughmore-Castleiney. There really was a lot to admire about the way they went about their business in both those games. However, if they are to be successful in the wide open spaces of Semple Stadium, I feel they will have to transition the ball guicker from back to front and kick-pass more often than they have done to date. Despite putting up a spirited performance against Clonmel Commercials in the group stages, they still lost that game 2:11 to 0:09, so to come with the same tactics and approach will not suffice. What was it Albert Einstein said? "Insanity is doing the same thing over and over and expecting different results.

Clonmel Commercials are kings of the turnover and the stats tell us the team that wins the turnover count wins the game 82% of the time. If Upperchurch-Drombane dilly-dally between the two 45m lines then they will be punished. Commercials scored 1-07 from turnover ball against Moyle Rovers in the semi-final. It's an impressive but not a surprising return from a team who are going for their third county final win in four years.

Commercials are a team littered with household names, many of them aiming for a club record sixth county medal and marking them makes minding mice at a crossroads seem like an easy task. Jason Lonergan has been on fire in this championship and is a player that Upperchurch-Drombane will have to keep a special eye on. Full forward Sean O'Connor has scored 2-21 in the championship which is an impressive tally in just five matches. Add into the mix players like Kevin

Fahey, Jamie Peters, Michael Quinlivan and anyone with the surname Kennedy and you can immediately see the task facing Upperchurch-Drombane.

This is a Clonmel Commercials team who tick a lot of boxes. Every single one of them is comfortable on the ball and physically they are an imposing side. They are also a battle hardened and mentally strong team who know how to dig out games.

If they have a weakness, it is that they often don't play to their maximum capacity for the full hour. In this year's championship they have started all their games slowly before blitzing teams in the second half. If they want to be crowded county champions at 5pm this evening, they will have to manage their game better and aim for a more consistent performance over the 60 minutes.

Commercials will be well aware of the challenge that faces them today. The warning shots were fired at them in the group stages and they will know that their movement both on and off the ball that day wasn't good enough. They go into todays game as worthy favourites but will also know that most of the county will be shouting for their opponents. That's the nature of the beast in GAA. Nobody ever roots for the townies.

A fascinating game is in store between two teams with contrasting styles. The best advice I can offer supporters attending todays game is to sit back and enjoy two teams giving it their best, their almighty best!



PREVIEW - INTERMEDIATE FINAL

HEATRE BUFFS will tell you that the opening number in any musical sets the mood and tone for the show. Today's opening number is the FBD Insurance County Intermediate Football Final between CJK Mullinahone and Ballina. This could prove to be the

game of the weekend and will set the mood and tone for a great afternoon of football in Tom Semple's Field.

If CJK Mullinahone are to land their fourth intermediate title this afternoon, they will have to match the desire which Ballina carry into the game as they go in search of their

first Intermediate championship. When these two sides met in the group stages back on the 13th August it was CJK Mullinahone who ran out comfort-

able 2-10 to 0-08 winners. However, many experts and indeed many non-experts believe that since that match, CJK Mullinahone's performances have remained consistent but Ballina have improved beyond all recognition and that today's game will be a much tighter affair.

Before a ball was kicked in this year's FBD Intermediate Football Championship, I can't have been the only one who believed that Grangemockler-Ballyneale and Galtee Rovers were the two favourites for county honours but both those clubs have been knocked out of the competition in emphatic style by Ballina. It can't be coincidence that their upturn in form coincided with the return from injury of Tipperary footall star, Steven O'Brien. However, Ballina are not just reliant on Steven. Far from it. Tom Lee, James Hanley, Conor Power along with Ben and Dara King would be additions to any team in the county and if county star Teddy Doyle is available for selection that would be an obvious bonus.

The last two years has been quite a journey for Kevin Byrne's team. County Junior Champions and beaten Munster finalists in 2021 when they had the services of three Kiladangan players available to them. This year one couldn't help but wonder how they would navigate the higher grade of intermediate football especially without the help of their

neighbours. We needn't have wondered at all. They navigated their way through this year's championship with such skill that Ferdinand Magellan would approve.

Their opposition today, CJK Mullinhone have arguably been the most consistent team in the cham-

> pionship to date. They have moonwalked their way through the competition averaging 18 points per game and conceding an average of just 9. They may not have been as impressive in their semi-final win over Golden-Kilfeackle but semi-finals are about winning not performance and that game may

just have provided them with the challenge they needed to set them up nicely for today's final.

Their half back line of Conor Shelley, Sean Curran

and Conor O'Brien provide both a stout defence and solid launching pad for their attacks. Up front Kevin Walzer is still a relatively young man in terms of the real world but he has been doing the business for CJK Mullinahone for a good number of years now

and he continues to impress while county senior football players Martin Keogh and Mikey O'Shea do exactly what it says on the tin. If Ballina are to hold any chance today you feel they will have to curb the scoring threats of O'Shea and Waltzer.

This is a game between two sides with very similar styles of play. Both like to build slowly and transfer the ball by hand more than by foot. Discipline will be an important factor as both sides have free takers who will prove that crime doesn't pay. I see the middle third of the field becoming the real battle ground. The team that can win the dirty ball in this area, transition it to attack the guickest and maybe take the odd chance of delivering guick ball by foot could well be the team climbing the steps of the new stand to collect the Barrett Cup when referee Sean Everard signals full stop.

I spoke with a friend of mine last night from Moyne, a village that never reared a fool. He had a slight preference for Ballina while I had a slight preference for Mullinahone. Neither of us ruled out extra time.







HE famous green and gold of Clonmel Commercials come to Thurles today in search of their 20th county title and their 5th in eight years.

Affiliated to the GAA in 1934, the club's first taste of county success came in the form of a minor title in 1935. A County Junior title followed in 1940, before the club's first Senior title in 1944. The 60's were a golden age for the club, winning three county titles in a row in 1965, 1966 and 1967. The captain on all three teams was Brian O'Callaghan.

Titles followed in the 70s and 80s, with the late great John McNamara the brains behind many of those successes. The club's two county titles of the 90's came in 1990 and 1994. On both these occasions Commercials were beaten in the Munster Senior Club Final. 1994 was the club's fourth appearance in the provincial final where they were beaten by Castlehaven.

In 2015 after winning their third County title of the new century, Commercials reached their first Munster Senior Club Championship final since 1994 after a 1-13 to 0-3 win against Milltown Malbay in the semi-final. On 29 November 2015, Commercials managed by Charlie McGeever won their first Munster Senior Club title after defeating Nemo Rangers in the final in Mallow. Trailing by two points in the second minute of injury time, Michael Quinlivan scored with a low shot to the net to win the game by one point on a scoreline of 1-07 to 0-09. Titles 17, 18 and 19 were added in 2017, 2019 and 2020 and if they were to win no 20 today it would see them just one win behind near neighbours Fethard on the role of honour. Clonmel Commercials reached their sixth Munster Club Final in 2019 but on this occasion they were comprehensively defeated by Nemo Rangers 0-15 to 0-6.

A vibrant juvenile club underpins much of this success with teams from U6 level coached by many of the great volunteers in the club. We're looking forward to the colour and atmosphere our young stars of the future bring to this great occasion today.

The lady's club has grown at all levels over the last few years and has also seen success, winning Junior and Intermediate titles at County level in the last decade and this year the Seniors have a Munster B semi-final to look forward to after a lastminute victory over Fermoy in the Munster quarter-final last weekend.

From all at Clonmel Commercials, we wish Manager Tommy Morrissey, Captain Jamie Peters and all the team and backroom staff the best of luck in the quest for title No 20 today against Upperchurch/Drombane.

OYLE ROVERs club won the County Senior Football Championships of 1995 & 1996 and they are being hon-

25-year practice at Semple Stadium for their achievement, a little belatedly because of Covid.


It was an historic period for Moyle Rovers, a rural club based in the parish of Powerstown/Lisronagh

sandwiched between Clonmel and Fethard. While the parish was actively involved in the G.A.A. since its foundation, the present club was founded in 1928 and had its first major success when winning the county junior championship in 1959.


The significance of the victory in 1995 was summed up by Tony Lonergan in the 1996 Yearbook: "On Sunday, September 24th, history was made at Cahir when Moyle Rovers captured its first county senior football title by

> defeating near neighbours and great rivals, Clonmel Commercials, by 3-13 to 0-12. As the final whistle sounded scenes of unrestrained joy were witnessed as players and spectators massed together to celebrate the famous day for our club and parish. To try and describe these precious

moments is difficult, in one's mind was a sense of pride and delight mixed with a certain sadness that so many who had worked so hard to make this day happen were not with us to

COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

The county championship had eight teams, two from each of the divisions. Nenagh Eire Óg and Borrisokane represented the North, Loughmore Castleiney and St. Kevin's the Mid, Golden-Kilfeacle and Lattin-Cullen the West and Clonmel Commercials and Moyle Rovers from the South.

Of all of the divisional championships, the South was the most competitive and produced many exciting games. Eight teams participated, Ardfinnan, Ballyporeen, Cahir, Commercials, Fethard, Grangemocklers, Kilsheelan and Moyle Rovers, with Commercials, Fethard, Grangemockler and Moyle Rovers gaining their places in the last four. Commercials and Moyle Rovers qualified for the final with victories over Fethard and Grangemockler respectively.

The South final was played at Ardfinnan and proved disappointingly one-sided as Moyle Rovers gained their second title in the grade, winning convincingly by 2-12 to 1-7. The winners were inspired by 'Man of the Match', Derry Foley, and Commercials were unable to match their tireless running, chasing and sheer hard work. The big question now was could Moyle Rovers make history and gain their first county senior football crown!

The South teams were drawn against the North in the county quarter-finals but the withdrawal of Nenagh Eire Óg and Borrisokane from the championship gave free passage to Commercials and Moyle Rovers respectively. In the other quarter-finals Loughmore-Castleiney defeated Golden-Kilfeacle by 0-8 to 0-5 at Drombane, and Nicky English inspired Lattin-Cullen to a 1-16 to 1-8 victory

over St. Kevin's at New Inn, both games played on August 11.

Both South teams came through in the semi-finals. At Boherlahan on September 2, Moyle Rovers defeated Loughmore-Castleiney in a gripping contest, that might have gone either way. Loughmore looked good at half-time, leading by 2-3 to 0-5 against the breeze. However, it was Moyle Rovers who took over in the second half and drew level with twelve minutes remaining. During the final period they scored two points to Loughmore's one and won by 1-12 to 2-8.

In the second game, played at New Inn on the same evening, Commercials defeated a dogged Lattin-Cullen side by 0-12 to 0-9, after leading by 0-7 to 0-3 at the interval.

THE FINAL

Moyle Rovers went into the final at Cahir on September 24 as slight underdogs, even though they had defeated their opponents convincingly in the South final. Nobody would have forecast the comprehensiveness of their win. In fact their three-goal victory would have been greater but for the brilliance of Philly Ryan in the Commercials goals. Three goals in the first half gave the winners a commanding margin of 3-6 to 0-6 at the interval, and Commercials could make no impression on the lead in the second half. In the end the Moyle Rovers margin of victory was 3-12 to 0-12.

Tom Lonergan describes the scene after the final whistle: "Then great scenes of jubilation and emotion unfolded, as players and mentors were mobbed by excited supporters and as football chairman Sean Mockler presented the O'Dwyer Cup to captain, Liam Cronin, the long wait was over and the fans celebrated in style. Derry Foley was awarded the 'Man of the Match'. The fifteen players that started and finished this county final were all heroes in their own way, the players on

the bench too had made their contribution on the run up to the final, and last but not least the three selectors, trainer and back-up team, whose trojan efforts helped to secure this victory. We compliment one and all on this magnificent achievement."

MUNSTER CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

In their first Munster Club championship, Moyle Rovers lost the Munster final. They defeated Waterford champions, Rathcormack, in the first round by 1-13 to 1-8 in Waterford on October 22. They followed up with a victory over Clare champions, Doonbeg in the semi-final, by 1-9 to 0-8 at Ardfinnan on November 5. However, they were badly beaten by Laune Rangers, 3-19 to 2-4, in the Munster final at Páirc Ui Rinn on November 11.

Moyle Rovers Make it two-in-a-row in 1996

THE SOUTH senior football championship again proved the most competitive of the divisional contests with the same eight teams as in 1995 competing. There were many outstanding games at the league stage before Commercials defeated Ardfinnan and holders, Moyle Rovers, ousted Grangemockler in the semi-finals, to set up another Commercials-Moyle Rovers decider.

This game was played at Kilsheelan on August 4. Commercials were behind at the break by 1-7 to 1-5 and were in with a chance, but they could add only two points to their tally in the second period during which the superior level of fitness of Moyle Rovers told and they well deserved their 2-11 to 1-7 victory.

COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

Because there were no teams from the North, there were only two county quarterfinals. The South were drawn against the Mid, with the West teams getting byes to the semi-finals. The quarter-finals took place on August 24. Moyle Rovers defeated J. K. Brackens very convincingly on a scoreline of 3-19 to 0-3. In the second game Commercials had to fight all the way to beat Loughmore-

Castleiney by 1-10 to 0-11.

The semi-finals were played at New Inn on September 7. John Owens, with an individual tally of 1-5, led the Moyle Rovers rout of Golden-Kilfeacle by 5-18 to 0-3. In the second game Commercials were flattered by their 2-11 to 1-5 victory over Lattin-Cullen. Leading by 1-5 to 1-3 at the break, they were helped greatly by an outstanding display by goalkeeper, Martin Quinlivan.

MARATHON FINAL

The county final was a marathon encounter taking three games and almost four hours of football before the championship was concluded. A repeat of the 1995 final, it was played at Ardfinnan, hosting the final for the first time, on October 6. In the first game Commercials almost reversed the previous year's result but had to be content with a draw, Moyle Rovers 0-9 Commercials 1-6. The replay, a week later, failed to separate them again, even with extra time. The result was Movle Rovers 1-10 Commercials 0-13. There was a lot of tension between the sides in this game and it boiled over only four minutes after the start. Punches were thrown with abandon and involved all but five or six players. As a result referee, Paddy Russell, send off one player and this was to be followed by three more dismissals in the course of the game.

The second replay was on October 28 and

Moyle Rovers came through, but only after extra time. They deserved their victory on a very stormy day, on which they shot twentyfour wides to Commercials' eight. At halftime the ultimate winners led by 0-2 to 0-1, and the sides were locked ay 0-4 each at full time. Moyle Rovers led by 0-10 to 0-5 at the interval in extra time and a Jim Williams goal a couple of minutes from time, clinched the issue for the champions on a scoreline of 1-12 to 0-9.

The O'Dwyer Cup was presented to the Moyle Rovers captain, John Owens, by Football Board chairman, Sean Mockler. In the course of his acceptance speech he dedicated the win to 'Mr. Moyle Rovers', Mick McCarthy, who was unable to attend the game. He said that Mick epitomised the spirit of the club and often kept the club going during the less successful times.

There was a great feeling of relief for Moyle Rovers team and supporters when victory was eventually achieved. It had been a long campaign, seven games in the league stage of the South championship, a semifinal and final, followed for five games in a county championship, a total of fourteen games in all! Has to be a record!

MUNSTER CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

The marathon county final didn't help Moyle Rovers in the Munster club championship. They played Waterford champions, Rathcormack, in the first round at Dungarvan on November 3, and failed narrowly by a point. The Waterford champions led by 1-4 to 0-4 at half-time, and were in front by a point, 1-9 to 1-8, at the end. Declan Browne scored 1-5 of Moyle Rovers total.

MOYLE ROVERS Player Profiles 1995 & 1996

CRONIN, Liam (Captain 1995)

Liam Cronin was an outstanding full back and leader on the field. His ability to read the game and be first to the ball was second to none. Liams passion, committment and discipline proved to be inspirational during '95 and '96. An ever present in all Club activities to this day.

BROWNE, Declan

At the tender age of 17, Declan was Culbaire in 1995, pulling off numerous magnificent saves throughout the year. In 1996 Declan became a scoring machine in the full forward line, earning massive respect for the outstanding skills he displayed. It is amazing how he displayed such poise and composure at such an early age. Totally committed and dedicated to Moyle Rovers he became a role model for so many Moyle Rovers juveniles.

POWER, Eamon

Eamon was one of the elder statesmen of the team holding down the right corner back position throughout '95 and '96. A tough, no nonsense corner back who gave everything to his club and team mates. Scored a tremendous goal in the Munster Club Final in 1995.

WALL, Noel

Noel owned the left corner back position during '95 and '96, demonstrating amazing pace and discipline in the tackle. Seldom beaten by his marker, he contributed numerous scores throughout the two seasons. Bravery, commitment and tenacity were the hallmarks of this top class corner back.

O'CONNOR, Kevin

Kevin was a very effective wing back, who proved very difficult to pass and often was the launch pad for attacks from the back line. A strong fielder and tight marker, Kevin was part of a settled half back line who could read and adapt to threats from the opposition. 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REGULATIONS Stáid Semple

- All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Rules (which are designated to protect the Health and Safety of all entrants to the ground). Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all of these Rules.
- 2. The management reserves the right of admission.
- The instructions of the stewards must be obeyed at all times.
- All persons entering the ground agree to be searched by a member of the Garda Síochána.
- Every person (including infants) entering the ground must have a ticket.
- 6. The following are not permitted:
- 6.1 Entry upon the pitch or engaging in conduct that causes or is likely to cause injury or harm to, or otherwise interferes with, disrupts, hinders, or distracts a person playing in, refereeing or otherwise having a role in a match at this ground.
- 6.2 Any unauthorised contact with the boundary wall surrounding the pitch or incursion on to the pitch. Any such unauthorised contact or incursion constitutes a trespass to property.
- 6.3 The climbing of floodlights or other pylons, stands or other buildings. Such behavior constitutes a trespass to property.
- 6.4 Throwing of objects onto the pitch.
- 6.5 Remaining or loitering in any gangway or aisle.6.6 Behaving in an offensive or indecent
- 6.6 Behaving in an offensive or indecent manner.
- 6.7 Bringing of alcohol into the ground.
- 6.8 Bringing into the ground of fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, distress signals, laser pointers and similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon.
- 6.9 Excessive noise such as that from use of radio sets, air horns, vuvuzelas or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language.
- If a person commits a trespass, reasonable force may be used to prevent, restrain or terminate any trespass.
- 8. Where a person is in breach of any of these rules, or where the management believes that a person constitutes a source of danger to others, or to the ground, such person may be refused entry or ejected from the ground, and reasonable force may be used for that purpose.

Safety and General Information

Supporters are asked to respect the fact that they are entering and leaving the stadium through residential areas.

Safety Notice



In the interests of safety, patrons will not be allowed to enter the playing area after the games.
